Dear Friends.

Please keep in your prayers those less fortunate than ourselves, especially people living on our streets under these harsh conditions, and if you can, please donate any spare clothing, blankets or cash to our local Vinnies who are always working so hard to help so many in need. We also need to keep praying for our farmers, both here and further up the Valley, who are now desperately in need of rain.

I'd like to take this opportunity to specially thank everyone around our parishes for your wonderful support over this past month during which Fr Paul has been away on annual leave. Special mention must go to our excellent office staff who do so much behind the scenes with their great administrative skills to keep our six parishes going. 

# Frequently asked...about Parish Evangelisation Cells and the Parish Evangelisation Cell System



### What is a Parish Evangelisation Cell?

A group of six to 14 people, initially made up from parishioners. The cell group meets fortnightly, normally in a member's home.

### What happens at a cell gathering?

Gatherings follow a set format, including praying together and listening to input from the Parish Priest, sharing and discussions and intentional prayers. The meetings focus on praying for and finding ways to reach out with the Gospel to family, friends, neighbours, school friends, workmates etc.



### Who can be in a cell?

Anybody. Initially, each cell is made up of parishioners who have put themselves forward to join a cell group. But it is hoped that each cell will then attract new members. The new members may be folk from inside the Parish or people who used to come to Church but have stopped doing so. Or they may be people (family, friends, neighbours, school friends, workmates and so on) without a Church background.

### On what day and at what time will cell group meetings take place?

Cell group gatherings will be held fortnightly, with each cell group meeting in the same (Monday to Saturday) week. We expect that cell groups will meet on different days of the week and at different times of the day. When you ask to join a cell group, you will be asked to nominate which days and times would work for you.



### Why do the groups focus on evangelisation?

Because evangelisation -- proclaiming the good news about Jesus Christ -- is central to the Church's mission. But the cell groups also help members to learn more about, and to deepen, their faith. They are small, loving and supportive mini-communities within the wider Parish community.

### Isn't evangelisation Protestant rather than Catholic?


No. The Catholic Church is quite clear about this -- evangelisation is what the Church is all about; and it is the responsibility of each member of the Church, not just our clergy and those in religious orders.

### Are cells a new idea? And why are the groups called "cells"?

They're not really new at all – remember that the early Church was formed of small groups meeting in people's homes. They are called "cells" because they are intended to attract new members, grow and eventually divide.

#### How can I join a cell group?


You can join a cell group at any time. You can get information about the current cell gatherings by contacting Sam via email at Sam.Hill@mn.catholic.org.au or on 0414 278 069.



When you receive your application form there will be time slots of current cell groups to pick from. Alternatively you may be asked to join a particular cell meeting by an existing member. Accept the invitation and come and try.

## Back to Gaol for Jodí



I hope Jodi Hinshelwood has plenty of winter woolies. She'll need them, for on Thursday night, 29<sup>th</sup> August, she will take part in the Maitland Gaol **Vinnies Community Sleepout.** 

Jodi will sleep outdoors on a cardboard mat. She doesn't expect to get much sleep, but that will be nothing new for Jodi, a prison warden in NSW gaols for the past fifteen years.

"We don't sleep on night duty," explains Jodi. "The night begins with a headcount, then supervision of the evening meal. We ensure each prisoner returns to his/her cubicle, and finally turn off lights at 9.00pm. The remainder of the night is spent doing security checks or monitoring on screens. By comparison the community sleepout will be a breeze."

Among the prison population a number of inmates have suffered from the curse of homelessness. Jodi has seen the problem first hand, and wishes to raise awareness. She also aims to raise \$1000.

### The History of the Catholic Church in the Maitland Area Part 3

#### The First Reinforcements

When Fr Therry was suspended as official Catholic Chaplain, Rev Fr Daniel Power was appointed to replace him. Fr Power arrived in the colony on 3<sup>rd</sup> December 1826. He was a sickly man and died on 14<sup>th</sup> March 1830.

Governor Darling then appealed to the British Government to send two Chaplains to the colony. It was not for concern of the Catholic people who were without an official chaplain but more to displace Fr Therry who though deprived of his chaplaincy and salary, was held in high regard and affection by the people. The Governor's hope was that the new chaplains would work obediently with the government. **Fr Vincent Christopher Dowling** and **Fr John McEnroe** were nominated.

Fr Dowling arrived in Sydney on 17<sup>th</sup> September 1831 on the *'Mary Ann'* accompanied by his sister, Mary Theresa who married David Chambers, a solicitor, on 8<sup>th</sup> May 1832. Fr Dowling soon gained widespread support and secured government funds for the education of Catholic children.

It was not long, however, before difficulties began between Fr Dowling and Fr Therry and this continued until the arrival of Fr John McEnroe in August 1832. Fr McEnroe was very patient and tactful and became a great friend of Fr Therry until his death in 1864.

Fr Dowling was appointed chaplain for the Hawkesbury by Governor Bourke and went to Windsor where he established a school and became friends with John Macarthur who gave land and money for a Catholic chapel at Camden. Fr Dowling performed the first Catholic marriage and baptism at Windsor on 1<sup>st</sup> January 1835. He was later appointed to Maitland.

The Maitland parish covered the whole Hunter River district and extended north indefinitely. Ill health began to make it difficult for Fr Dowling to minister in the huge Maitland area and in September 1838 he was moved to Newcastle as its first resident priest. His health continued to decline and he relied heavily on assistant priests. He gave up his active ministry in 1863 and became a living legend in the district. He died on 14<sup>th</sup> December 1873 and, at his request, was buried in St Joseph's Churchyard, East Maitland. [*Australian Dictionary of Biography Vol. 4 (MUP) 1972*]

In February 1833 **Fr William Bernard Ullathorne**, a young Benedictine monk, arrived in Sydney. W. P. Morris, the vicar apostolic of Mauritus, a mission embracing Australia, had appointed Fr Ullathorne as his vicar-general.

Fr Ullathorne's arrival was not received well by Fr Philip Connolly in Hobart or by Fr Therry in Sydney. However he took control without hesitation and put things into an organized system welding the two factions among the three priests who were residing in New South Wales into one band. He visited the Hunter Valley many times as noted in the following extract from his autobiography.

"Fr Therry often made visits into the more populous parts of the interior. I visited Maitland, on the Hunter River; St Patrick's Plains, higher up in the country; Newcastle, at the mouth of the Hunter; the beautiful district of Illawarra; Bathurst beyond the Blue Mountains, and sometimes Parramatta. Our usual way of travelling was on horseback, with a servant on another horse carrying the vestments and an altar-stone."

Maitland was again mention in another interesting quote from Fr Ullathorne.

"Riding at Maitland along the fertile banks of the River Hunter, it was impossible not to admire the beauty of those primitive forests and the fertile abundance produced by the deep and rick alluvial soil. Then there were the varied notes of the birds. I was riding through the woods with Mr Walker, the chief supporter of our religion in that locality, when I heard at some distance first a whistle, then the crack of a whip, than the reverberation of the lash. I asked: 'What road is that over there?' 'There is not road,' he replied. 'But I heard a man driving, and there again.' 'Oh, that's the coachman.' 'But the coachman must have a road'. 'The coachman's a bird,' said he; and bird it was, exactly imitating the whistle of a coachman and the crack and lashing of his whip. Then the bellbird rang its silver bell, and another species cried like a child in trouble, whilst flocks of parrots made a croaking din, and flights of black cockatoos spread over the fields of maize with a noise like the rusty hinges of an old castle all flapping together in the wind."

Fr Ullathorne only remained a short time in Australia but during his time here he established the Church on a legal footing and set up the first real administration of the church in Australia.

### St Joseph's Church, East Maitland

It is well known that the first church built north of Sydney was St Joseph's at East Maitland. When it was exactly built is not known but historical evidence seems to indicate that it was built over a period of years and more than one of the early priests were involved.

When **Fr James Watkins** took up the position of first resident priest of St Joseph's in 1835, it was described as having 'a roof of sorts and an earthen floor, excepting the Sanctuary, where it was of wood'. In the original plan of the town of Maitland (East Maitland) drawn up in 1829 by the Surveyor-General, Sir Thomas Mitchell, the corner of King Street, East Maitland and the present Newcastle Road is marked for the Roman Catholic Church. The site was

opposite the gallows and as tradition states was the place that the priest camped and waited for the prisoner to arrive. The land became known as the priest's paddock.

Further evidence that St Joseph's church was built prior to 1830 can be taken from an article written by D J Ryan that appeared in the *Sentinel* in 1932.

"The late Mr Frederick Crew, who arrived in Maitland in November, 1830, gave some information in an interview with the writer when he was speaking of early days in Maitland in these words: 'I arrived in Newcastle late in November, 1830, when there was a rough track, called a road, between Newcastle and Maitland, and came in a dray to Maitland from Newcastle on November 30, 1830.



As I came over the hill from One Mile Creek, two things struck me. I saw on my left, on Stockade Hill, a gallows, and on my right hand side, the unfinished walls of the Roman Catholic Chapel which was not roofed over.' As Mr Crew was at that time in his 23<sup>rd</sup> year, he was old enough to form impressions as he passed along, and he may be regarded as a reliable witness in the present investigation. There is historical record of the fact that on the morning of November 30, 1830, five men had been hanged on Stockade Hill, and we know that Fr Therry was present at the execution."

The structure described above is thought to be of a previous temporary chapel as there is evidence that Fr Therry laid the foundation stone of old St Joseph's Church on Tuesday, 12<sup>th</sup> August 1834 as was reported in the Australian newspaper of 22<sup>nd</sup> August 1834.

Mr Editor. — Will you have the goodness to make known to the public, that the Rev. J. J. Therry, laid the foundation stone of a Catholic Chapel here on Tuesday last. The ceremony was novel and interesting, being the first public building commended here. Great praise is due to the worthy and indefatigable Clergyman alluded to — surely the people will bestir themselves, and endeavor to obtain him a salary. As funds are wanting to complete the undertaking, it is hoped the liberal minded will contribute to so good a work. Yours, &c. &c. W.J. Maitland August 14, 1834

(We trust that the public will take into their consideration the high importance of instructing a large body of the community, in their moral and religious duties. And although they may not agree in sentiment, with the promoters of this design; yet being assured of the good that must result, they will liberally contribute to carry into effect an object so desirable in itself and so praiseworthily commenced. – Ed.)

Funds for the building of the Church came from Government grants and private subscription and both Fr Therry and Fr Ullathorne had input into the design. Stone from the nearby Glebe quarry was used and it is believed that the church was completed early in 1835.

Fr Ullathorne tells us in his autobiography: "...I had also to look after the completion of the church begun at Maitland, and to start another at Parramatta. I had the assistance of the Government Architect in devising the plans. But, what to my surprise, on arriving at Maitland, to find that without my knowledge, Father Therry had been there and had doubled the number of windows in the walls. This was one of his singularities, to put as many windows in a building as the walls would allow of, without any consideration for the intense glare of heated light......At Maitland he spoiled what would have been a well-proportioned nave in the old lancet style. His taste in architecture was for what he called opes; if a plan was brought to him, his first question was: 'How many opes would it admit of?' He could not, understand the principle of adapting the light of a building to the climate."

The parish registers of East Maitland did not begin until late 1835 with the arrival of the first resident priest, Fr Watkins. Whatever baptisms or marriages conducted in the early years of the Catholic Church in Maitland were recorded in the registers of St Mary's Church on Fr Therry's return to Sydney. St Joseph's was an outstation of Sydney.

### Saints and Feasts in August 2019



**1ST AUGUST, ST ALPHONSUS LIGUORI** was born near Naples in 1696, and was the son of a nobleman. He was a successful lawyer before being ordained a priest at the age of 29. In 1731, Alphonsus refounded a community of nuns and a year later he founded the Congregation of the Holy Redeemer; a community of priests dedicated to preaching to the poor in rural towns. He

was bishop of Saint Agatha dei Goti for thirteen years before retiring due to ill health. He published more than thirty theological and devotional works and as a result was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1871.

**3RD AUGUST, ST DOMINIC DE GUZMAN** was born in Calaruega, Spain, in c.1170. One legend suggests that at his baptism, his mother saw a shining star appear in front of him. Dominic became a priest at the age of twenty six, and several years later was made the unofficial leader of a papal




mission to the Albigensian heretics in the French province of Languedoc. For this work he trained a group of religious women and established a nunnery at Prouille. Soon the idea of an order of preachers began to grow, and in 1216 the order of Friars Preachers was formally approved by Rome. With a strong emphasis on the vow of poverty, the Friars Preachers became popular missionaries in Western Europe, Asia and the Americas.



4TH AUGUST, ST JOHN VIANNEY, May 1786 – 4 August 1859), was a French parish <u>priest</u> who is venerated in the Catholic Church as a saint and as the patron saintof parish priests. He is often referred to as the "Curé d'Ars" (i.e., Parish Priest of Ars), internationally known for his priestly and pastoral work in his parish

in Ars, France, because of the radical spiritual transformation of the community and its surroundings. Catholics attribute this to his saintly life, mortification, his persevering ministry in the sacrament of confession, and his ardent devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary.



OFOUR LORD TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD is an episode in the New Testament narrative in which Jesus is transfigured and becomes radiant upon a mountain. The Synoptic Gospels (Matthew 17:1-9, Mark 9:2-8, Luke 9: 28-36)

describe it and 2 Peter 1:16-18 refers to it. On the mountain, Jesus begins to shine with bright rays of light. Then the prophets Moses and Elijah appear next to him and he speaks with them. Jesus is then called "Son" by voice in the sky, assumed to be God the Father, as in the Baptism of Jesus. The transfiguration is one of the five major milestones in the gospel narrative of the life of Jesus, the others being Baptism,

Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension. The transfiguration not only supports the identity of Jesus as the Son of God (as in His Baptism), but the statement "listen to him", identifies him as the messenger and mouth-piece of God. The significance of this identification is enhanced by the presence of Elijah and Moses, for it indicates to the apostles that Jesus is the voice of God "par excellence", and instead of Elijah or Moses, he should be listened to, surpassing the laws of Moses by virtue of his filial relationship with God.

8TH AUGUST, ST MARY OF THE CROSS **MACKILLOP** was born in Fitzroy, Melbourne, in 1842, the eldest child of Scottish immigrants. In 1861 she moved to the small town of Penola in South Australia, where she met Fr Julian Tenison Woods. Together they established Australia's first free Catholic school. In 1866 she co-founded Australia's first religious order, the



Sisters of St Joseph, and took a vow of poverty. Soon there were 17 schools under her care, but Mary's refusal to abide by the rules of the Bishop in Adelaide led to her excommunication from the church. She was accepted back a year later and eventually shown respect by the Bishops for her work with the poor. Mary was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 1995, as a result of a woman who was cured of leukaemia in 1961 after a group offered prayers to Sister Mary. She was canonised by Pope Benedict XVI on 17 October 2010 and is now known as St Mary of the Cross.



10TH AUGUST, ST LAWRENCE was a deacon who lived in Rome at a time when Christians were being persecuted. He was closely associated with Pope Sixtus II, who was martyred a few days before Lawrence at the hands of Emperor Valerian. Popular tradition tells of Lawrence's rather gruesome death by fire, although he was most likely

executed with a sword, which was the usual method of capital punishment at the time. He became one of the early church's most popular martyrs and was especially renowned for his alms giving. St Lawrence is a patron of deacons.

11TH AUGUST, ST CLARE OF ASSISI was born in Italy in 1194 AD to a wealthy noble family. As a child she was devoted to prayer and at the age of eighteen she heard St Francis of Assisi preach and she was inspired to follow his example, despite the protestations of her family. After living a life of strict poverty with the Benedictine nuns, she eventually lead a



new order known as the "Poor Ladies of San Damiano". For a time the order was directed by St Francis himself, and Clare cared for him in his final days. In 1224 the Prussian King, Frederick II led an army to take the town of Assisi. It is believed that Clare faced the army carrying only the Blessed Sacrament, and that suddenly the army was overcome with fear and fled. Ten years after her death in 1253, her order

became known as the Order of St Clare.



15TH AUGUST, THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY. The Feast of the Assumption celebrates the belief that the body and soul of the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken into heaven after the end of her earthly life. Mary's assumption into heaven is seen by many as a fulfilment of Jesus' promise to all faithful servants; that

they too will be received into the kingdom of God. Mary is seen as the first disciple of Jesus and a model for all disciples; it is fitting that she receive the gift of discipleship first of all. Belief in the Assumption of Mary had become widespread by the end of the seventh century and was eventually defined in an infallible statement by Pope Pius XII in 1950.

21ST AUGUST, ST PIUS X, Giuseppe Sarto was born into a poor family in 1835. From this humble beginning he was eventually elected pope in 1903. He took as his motto, "To restore all things in Christ". Pius X was remembered for many things including advocating the frequent reception of holy communion and the admission to it of children from



the age of about seven; reform of church music and encouraging the use of Gregorian chant; the reform of Canon Law; the reorganization of the Roman curia; and the separation of church and state in France. He also promoted Bible reading for all Catholics and encouraged the use of clear and simple homilies. He found some aspects of the Vatican's wealth and ceremony distasteful. Before his death in 1914, Pius X wrote in his will, "I was born poor, I have lived poor, and I wish to die poor."



22ND AUGUST, THE QUEENSHIP OF MARY is a Marian feast day in the liturgical calendar of the Roman Catholic Church, created by Pope Pius XII. On 11 October 1954, the Pontiff pronounced the new feast in his encyclical *Ad caeli reginam*. The feast was celebrated on May 31, the last day of the Marian month. The feast is a logical follow-up to the Assumption and

is now celebrated on the octave day of that feast. In 1969, Pope Paul VI moved the feast day to 22 August. It has been placed eight days after the Solemnity of the Assumption, in order to emphasize the close bond between Mary's queenship and her glorification in body and soul next to her Son. The Second Vatican Council's Constitution on the Church states that "Mary was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen of the universe, that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son" (Lumen Gentium, 59).

24TH AUGUST, ST BARTHOLOMEW was one of the twelve apostles, but very little is known about him. Scholars believe that he was the man known as Nathanael, who was introduced to Jesus by St Philip. In the synoptic Gospels he is named Bartholomew, which means

"son of Tolmai". Some believe that he may have preached in India, where a Hebrew copy of Matthew's Gospel was found – believed to have been left by Bartholomew. He is also believed to have preached in Armenia where he was martyred.

28TH AUGUST, ST AUGUSTINE was born in 354 in Thagaste (now known as Algeria) to a pagan father and a Christian mother - St Monica. In a search for truth he explored many philosophies and theologies, though he rejected Christianity. In Milan, he heard Bishop Ambrose preach and in 387 he and his son were baptised by him. He returned to Northern Africa and established a monastic community and in 391 was ordained a priest. Five years later, Ambrose was chosen bishop of Hippo and for thirty-four years he served his diocese with authority and compassion. His vast writings (more than one-hundred books and five-hundred sermons) earned him the title, doctor of the church.

29TH AUGUST, THE PASSION OF ST JOHN THE BAPTIST, most scholars agree that John baptised Jesus. Scholars generally believe Jesus was a follower or disciple of John and several New Testament accounts report that some of Jesus' early followers had previously been followers of John. John the Baptist is also mentioned by Jewish historian Josephus. Some scholars maintain that John was



influenced by the semi-ascetic Essenes, who expected an apocalypse and practiced rituals corresponding strongly with baptism, although no direct evidence substantiates this. According to the New Testament, John anticipated a messianic figure greater than himself, and Jesus was the one whose coming John foretold. Christians commonly refer to John as the precursor or forerunner of Jesus, since John announces Jesus' coming. John is also identified with the prophet Elijah. In the gospel account of John's death, Herod has John imprisoned for denouncing his incestuous marriage, and later executes John by beheading. John condemned Herod for marrying Herodias (who was not only his brother Philip's former wife but also Herod's niece) in violation of Old Testament law. Later Herodias's daughter (traditionally thought to be Salome, who was Herod's grand-niece and stepdaughter) dances before Herod, who offers her a favour in return. Herodias tells her to ask for the head of John the Baptist, which is delivered to her on a plate (Mark 6:14-29).



# **Ordinary Time**



Ordinary Time is the period in which God reveals to us the face of Christ through the eyes of Matthew, Mark and Luke. In the 33 (sometimes 34) Sundays of Ordinary Time, some of which occur between Christmas and Lent (depending on the date set for Easter) and the remainder after Pentecost, we get on with the day-to-day faithful living of the Gospel.

The difference is that whereas the other Seasons of the Liturgy are focussed on one major faith event, Ordinary Time simply follows the Gospels. During this period, we hear a semi-continuous proclamation of the Scriptures over the 3-year cycle. It's as if the evangelists are our guides. Each year, one of them will lead us deeper into the mystery of the mission of Christ in the world.

**In Year A:** We meet Jesus the great teacher as introduced by Matthew. In Matthew's gospel, we find Christ actively present through the Church and the Sacraments.

**In Year B:** Mark shows us the mystery of Christ as truly divine and truly human – Son of God and Son of Man. Mark calls us into a response of faith by which we radically choose to leave all to follow Christ and become willing to share our conviction with others.

**In Year C:** (we are now in Year C) The 'social' gospel of Luke lays before us the practical meaning of following Christ. Luke outlines the role of the disciple and the cost of discipleship in our loving response to the needy and the outcast of society. Luke assures us that the Holy Spirit is always with us as we try to become Good News for our world.

Where, then, is the gospel of John? While there is no 'year' of John, the Church reflects each year on John's gospel during the Christmas and Easter cycles. John's gospel gives us a deeper appreciation of the meaning of the birth, death and resurrection of Jesus. He teaches us that Christ is the very source of our life in God.
