

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### Homily - 13th Sunday in Ordinary Sunday....by Fr John

The Lord often surprises and challenges us with His teachings. And today's Gospel is one such example: "Anyone who prefers father or mother to me...son or daughter to me is not worthy of me". Popular culture would probably bristle at these words and condemn them as being harsh and unreasonable.

Yet, we know the Lord loves us more than we could *ever* love anyone. If you could find the most devoted mother or father, son or daughter who has ever lived, and multiplied their love a hundred billion times, it still wouldn't hold a candle to God's love for every single one of us, no matter who we are or what we've done. So, no-one is missing out by the Lord asking us to do this.

All Jesus is saying is that we need to keep Him and His Gospel at front and centre of our lives, so He can use us most effectively to shine His saving grace into the lives of the people around us, especially those most in need of His saving help. And in telling us to specially welcome prophets and holy people (the Saints), He is highlighting the great example such people have set for us in giving up everything, including in many cases, all personal wealth, their homes, homelands and even families, in order to devote their lives exclusively to the spreading of the Good News. I think of Abraham and Sarah, Moses, the Apostles, St Francis Xavier, St Mother Teresa of Calcutta and St Mary MacKillop to name just a few.

The Lord is certainly not expecting us to abandon our loved ones or neglect our family responsibilities. For many our family will be our primary God-given vocation. But like the prophets and saints, we always need to keep the Lord and His saving message at the forefront of our lives. For example, there will be times when the teachings of the Lord and His Church may be at odds with our secular world's stance on certain social-moral issues, and we'll have close relatives and friends who would prefer us to support the secular view rather than the Gospel view on one or more issues. We'll feel we are being torn two ways. At such times we need to turn to the Lord in fervent prayer seeking His peace, wisdom and strength in order to stay the course while respecting the alternative view.

To keep our lives and our call to discipleship in perspective, I believe it can be helpful for us to recall that wonderful quote of St Mary MacKillop, "Remember we are but travellers here". It reminds us we are in the world but not of the world. We are like the Hebrews in the wilderness: in baptism we crossed the Red Sea and put the land of 'Egypt' (the way of the world) behind us, and embarked as a pilgrim people along a spiritual path toward the Promised Land, our eternal home. We will encounter many hardships along the way and none of us can make it on our own. Which is why the Lord gave us His Divine Son, His Blessed Mother, the prophets and the saints to inspire and guide us along the way, to help us to remain faithful in His service and never lose sight of our one final and glorious goal: life with God forever.



A PRAYER FOR SPIRITUAL COMMUNION: My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire to receive you in my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to you. # Message from Fr Paul

Dear Sisters and Brothers.

As many of you would know we were saddened to hear of Fr Michael Kelly's health issues last week. Fr Michael first arrived in Maitland on the 6th March. After two weeks in the parish he went to hospital suffering severe pain behind his left knee. He was diagnosed with an aneurysm and needed surgery. After surgery and some time of rest he returned to the parish at the beginning of April. Although we haven't had public Masses until two weeks ago, Fr Mick has been involved in the life of our parish communities over this time. On Wednesday evening 17th June Fr Mick returned to hospital suffering severe pain in his left leg once again. On Friday 19th June he was informed that he would need a below-knee amputation. He was taken to surgery on Friday afternoon. Then on Monday 22nd June the doctors informed him that he would need further surgery on that same leg, and on Tuesday afternoon the 23rd June he went to surgery for an above knee amputation. This is shocking news for Fr Mick and all of us. In the brief time that he has been with us our communities have warmed to his style of ministry. He is a very gifted and talented priest who was bringing a great richness to the life and ministry of our parishes. We will continue to keep him in our prayers for healing and recovery as he enters into this new stage of his life.

As parish communities we have been delighted that we can once again resume our public Masses, though with limited numbers. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our parish staff, our regional Pastoral council, our regional Finance council and our parish Pastoral teams for the wonderful work they have done during the three months that we have not been able to gather for Mass. In that time many efforts were made by many people to keep our parishioners connected to each other. Thank you one and all.

Though we have returned to public Masses we have yet to return to normal. The risk of the spread of the Corona Virus is still with us and this risk will not pass until a vaccine is found. In the mean time we as parish communities will seek to do everything we can to protect the health and wellbeing of our parishioners. At present the limit for public worship is 50 persons. Each church building has been measured according to the 4sq metre rule for social distancing so some of our smaller churches are not able to take 50 people, but we know what each church capacity is. When we resumed our public Masses we knew that each weekend we normally have over 1,000 attend the 10 weekend Masses in the eight churches of our region. In order to give everybody who wanted to come to Mass an opportunity to attend Mass we have offered each parish community the number of Masses they require to cater for those wishing to attend Mass. Some of these Masses are on week days but we have been holding the Sunday Liturgy on these days.

We thank you for your understanding and patience as we enter this period of "new normal" and we will seek to adjust our parish regulations as we receive updates from the Governments.

So let us continue to remember in prayer our world which is suffering the effects of this pandemic.

#### IMPLICATIONS OF THE 4 SQUARE METER RULE FOR THOSE WHO ARE ATTENDING MASS

Over the past few weeks we have enjoyed gathering together to celebrate Mass. Even though we may struggle with remembering the words to the Creed and our Peace be With You is now a wave and a smile, it is still a lovely feeling.

Each community have worked well to conform with the government Health Orders and our clergy have been very happy with the way all our volunteers have stepped up and taken on some of the very important tasks of cleaning, greeting and ensuring correct seating is managed and registering the number of attendees.

We all know that changes to the Health Order is ongoing and changes are expected on the 1st July. The media is predicting there may be an increase to the number of attendees at a religious service from 50 to 100. But this number increase will be hand-in- hand with the 4 square meter ruling. Fr Paul wanted everyone to be aware of your church capacity as per the 4 square meter rule. You will see from the table below that not all of our churches will be able to hold their average number of parishioners.

We will still be required to monitor numbers and maybe continue to celebrate more Masses than pre-Covid. In next week's bulletin Fr Paul will provide everyone with a further update after the government update.

One other thing which needs to be clarified is that in the past the maximum allowed number of attendees did not include essential workers but this part of the Order has been changed. Now ALL people are required to be included in the number of attendees. So the priest celebrating the Mass is to be included on the list of the number of people attending.

### Social and Affordable Housing Program



St Vincent de Paul Housing are building over 500 low cost Rental Housing homes across Sydney and regional NSW. 17 units in Maitland are nearing completion are due for occupancy in mid-July.



Dwellings are close to community services and transport. All homes are designed to 7 Star Energy level. Tenants are supported with tailored support coordination plans and are assisted to achieve their goals and aspirations. Tenants are also supported by Vinnies Conference members and volunteers.

Tenants are offered 12 months leases renewable each year. Rents for these homes are much lower than private market rent.

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### Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults - RCIA



# Saints and Feasts in July 2020



**3RD JULY ST THOMAS THE APOSTLE** was one of the twelve disciples commissioned by Jesus. In John's Gospel when upon hearing that Jesus had risen from the dead, Thomas replied, "Except I shall see in his hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and thrust my hand into his side, I will not believe". But when Jesus appeared Thomas then professed his faith - this story giving

rise to the name "doubting Thomas". After Jesus' death it is widely believed he sailed to India in 52AD where he established several churches in the southern state of Kerala. Tradition suggests he was martyred in 72AD; speared to death at a site now called St Thomas Mount, before being buried in Mylapore in modern day Chennai. St Thomas is one of the patron saints of India.



4TH JULY. ST ELIZABETH OF PORTUGAL Elizabeth 1271-1336, St. Elizabeth of Portugal was the daughter of Peter III of Aragon and was named after her great-aunt, St. Elizabeth of Hungary, whose virtues she also inherited. In her married life with King Denis of Portugal she had to undergo a series of heavy trials which she

endured with heroism. On more than one occasion she went to considerable pains to bring about peace between her children and their father. After her husband's death she became a Franciscan Tertiary and showed unfailing charity towards the poor. She died in 1336; her body has remained incorrupt. Before the reform of the General Roman Calendar St. Elizabeth's feast was celebrated on July 8



5TH JULY ST BARNABUS Born in 1502 in Cremona, Italy, Anthony became a medical doctor. In 1528 he was ordained a priest and cofounded the Barnabites, the religious congregation so called because it was headquartered in St. Barnabas Monastery in Milan. The Barnabites occupied the monastery in 1538, having been approved in 1533. Anthony popularized the forty-hour prayer ceremony, promoted the use of altar

sacraments, and introduced the ringing of church bells on Friday. He is depicted in liturgical art in habit. He died in 1539.



6TH JULY ST MARIA GORETTI was born in Ancona, Italy. She grew up on a farm with her mother and father and five brothers and sisters. In 1902 when she was only twelve years old, she was attacked by a nineteen year old farm hand. She survived in hospital for two days, forgave her attacker, asked God to forgive him and died holding a crucifix and a medal of Our Lady. She later appeared to her attacker in a vision while he was in prison. This led to

his conversion and he later testified at her cause for beatification.



9TH JULY ST AUGUSTINE ZHAO RONG AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS 87 Chinese Catholics and 33 Western missionaries from the mid-17th century to 1930, were martyred because of their ministry, and, in some cases for their refusal to apostatise. Many died in the Boxer Rebellion, in which anti-colonial peasant rebels slaughtered 30,000 Chinese converts to Christianity along with missionaries and other

foreigners. They are remembered with an optional memorial on this day.



11TH JULY ST BENEDICT was born at Nursia in c.480, the brother of St Scholastica. Most of what is known of his life comes from St Gregory the Great's writings. He left his studies in Rome to become a hermit in the mountains near Subiaco, and after a while many followers joined him. It is believed that some monks tried to poison him, possibly out of jealousy or due to his strict discipline. He moved to Monte Cassino,

where he completed his Rule; a written guide for those living a monastic life, with a strong emphasis on obedience, moderation and community life. Although Benedict never became a priest or ever intended to found a religious order, his Rule became the fundamental monastic code in Europe into the early middle ages.



13TH JULY ST HENRY (972-1024) As German king and Holy Roman Emperor, Henry was a practical man of affairs. He was energetic in consolidating his rule. He crushed rebellions and feuds. On all sides he had to deal with drawn-out disputes so as to protect his frontiers. This involved him in a number of battles, especially in the south in Italy; he also helped Pope Benedict VIII quell disturbances in Rome. Always his ultimate purpose was to establish a stable peace in

Europe. According to eleventh-century custom, Henry took advantage of his position and appointed as bishops men loyal to him. In his case, however, he avoided the pitfalls of this practice and actually fostered the reform of ecclesiastical and monastic life. He was canonized in 1146.



**18**TH JULY ST CAMILLUS DE LELLIS was born at Bocchianico, Italy. He fought for the Venetians against the Turks, was addicted to gambling. He became a Capuchin novice, but was unable to be professed because of a diseased leg he contracted while fighting the Turks. He devoted himself to caring for the sick, and became director of St. Giacomo Hospital in Rome. He received permission from his confessor (St. Philip Neri) to be ordained and

decided, with two companions, to found his own congregation, the Ministers of the Sick (the Camellians), dedicated to the care of the sick. They ministered to the sick of Holy Ghost Hospital in Rome, enlarged their facilities in 1585, founded a new house in Naples in 1588, and attended the plague-stricken aboard ships in Rome's harbour and in Rome. In 1591, the Congregation was made into an order to serve the sick by Pope Gregory XIV, and in 1591 and 1605, Camillus sent members of his order to minister to wounded troops in Hungary and Croatia, the first field medical unit. Gravely ill for many years, he resigned as superior of the Order in 1607 and died in Rome on July 14. He was canonised in 1746, was declared patron of the sick, with St. John of God, by Pope Leo XIII, and patron of nurses and nursing groups by Pope Pius XI.



15TH JULY ST BONAVENTURE joined the order of Franciscans in 1243, and was soon recognised for his intellectual talents. He was sent to study in Paris where he taught and preached for many years. He was a contemporary of St Thomas Aquinas, with whom he defended the mendicant friars against their opponents. In 1257, Bonaventure was elected as the head of the Franciscans, and has since been considered the greatest friar minor since St Francis

of Assisi himself. He wrote important works on theology, philosophy and mysticism, and was declared a doctor of the church in 1588. He was also regarded for his compassionate and gentle nature and for his accessibility to those who sought him



16TH JULY OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL Sacred Scripture celebrated the beauty of Carmel where the prophet Elijah defended the purity of Israel's faith in the living God. In the twelfth century, hermits withdrew to that mountain and later founded the Carmelite order devoted to the contemplative life under the patronage of Mary, the holy Mother of God. Devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel is worldwide, and most Catholics are familiar with the Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, also known as the Brown Scapular.

Mary appeared to St. Simon Stock on July 16, 1251, and gave him the scapular with the following words, which are preserved in a fourteenth century narrative: "This will be for you and for all Carmelites the privilege, that he who dies in this will not suffer eternal fire." The feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel was instituted for the

Carmelites in 1332, and extended to the whole Church by Benedict XIII in 1726.



**20TH JULY ST APOLLINARIS** was believed to be born in Antioch, in the Roman province of Syria. Tradition has it that he was the first bishop of Ravenna and was appointed by St Peter himself, after which, he faced constant persecution by Roman authorities. He was eventually arrested, tortured and put to death by the sword, although there is no reliable written information about his life and martyrdom. Apollinaris is a patron saint against epilepsy and gout.



**22ND JULY ST MARY MAGDALENE** St Mary of Magdala was a disciple of Christ who was healed by him when he cast out seven devils. She stood at the foot of the cross as Jesus died, and went to the tomb to anoint his body on the morning of Easter Sunday. She was the first witness to Jesus' resurrection when she found his tomb empty. In St Mark's Gospel, it is Mary Magdalene to whom the risen Jesus first appears and further to this, in St John's account, Jesus gives

her a message to pass on to his brethren. Since the time of Pope Gregory the Great, a tradition in the Western church arose that identified Mary Magdalene as the unnamed sinner who anointed Christ's feet, and Mary of Bethany, the sister of Martha and Lazarus. But since 1969 the new Roman calendar has rejected this belief entirely.



23RD JULY ST BRIDGET, RELIGIOUS. Patron saint of Sweden, Bridget married a young prince and lived happily with him for 28 years, bearing him eight children. St. Catherine of Sweden was their daughter. After her husband died, Bridget founded the Order of the Most Holy Saviour, erecting at Vadstena a double monastery for monks and nuns. Following the guidance of the Holy Spirit, she later went to Rome, where she worked for the return of the Popes from

Avignon. This Scandinavian mystic is famous for her Revelations concerning the sufferings of our Redeemer.



**25TH JULY ST JAMES, APOSTLE** James, with Peter and John are a group of three privileged disciples whom Jesus admitted to important moments in his life. Present for the Transfiguration event (Mk 9:2-8) they attend our Lord during his agony in the garden of Gethsemane. (Mk 14:32-42). We know nothing of St. James's early life. He was the brother of John, the beloved disciple, and the Synoptic Gospels tell us only that James and John were with their father by

the Sea of Galilee when Jesus called them to follow him. The only apostle whose martyrdom is recorded in the New Testament, James is traditionally believed to be the first of the twelve apostles martyred for his faith. Pope Benedict in reflecting on the apostles observed that James' journey from the mount of the Transfiguration to the mount of Agony symbolises the entire pilgrimage of Christian life. In following Jesus, like St James he says, we know that even in difficulties we are on the right path.



**26TH JULY STS JOACHIM AND ANNE,** Parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary Joachim was the husband of Saint Anne and the father of Mary the mother of Jesus, The story of Joachim and Anne first appears in the apocryphal Gospel of James. Joachim and Anne are not mentioned in the Bible.

According to tradition, Saint Anne was born in Bethlehem, and married Joachim of Nazareth, both descendants of David. Tradition has it that the parents of the Blessed Virgin, who, apparently, first lived in Galilee, came later on to settle in Jerusalem. However, as his wife was barren, the high priest rejected Joachim and his sacrifice, as his wife's childlessness was interpreted as a sign of divine

displeasure. Joachim consequently withdrew to the desert where he fasted and did penance for forty days. Angels then appeared to both Joachim and Anne to promise them a child. Joachim later returned to Jerusalem and embraced Anne at the city gate. There was ancient belief that a child born of an elderly mother who had given up hope of having offspring was destined for great things. Parallels occur in the Old Testament in the case of Hannah, mother of Samuel.



29TH JULY ST MARTHA. Jesus loved Martha, Mary and Lazarus. In St John's Gospel it tells of the special relationship Jesus had with the. Jesus was a frequent visitor to their home. We read of three visits in Luke 10:38-42, John 11:1-53 and John 12:1-9. Luke tells how Martha welcomes Jesus and his disciples into her home and immediately goes to work to serve them; whilst Mary sits and listens to Jesus. Jesus observes that Martha is worried about

many things that distract her from really being present to him and he reminds her that there is only one this that is truly important, listening to him. The next visit shows how well Martha learned his lesson. She is grieving the death of her brother. When she hears Jesus is in the area she goes to meet him. In her conversation with Jesus she shows her faith and courage stating clearly without doubt that she believes in Jesus' power, in the resurrection and most of all that Jesus is the Son of God. Jesus tells her he is the resurrection and the life and then goes on to raise her brother from the dead. Finally, Jesus returns to share a meal with his good friends and all we hear about Martha is simply that she "served". She isn't in the spotlight, she simply serves Jesus.



**30TH JULY ST PETER CHRYSOLOGUS** About 431, Peter, a deacon, became bishop of Ravenna, Italy. Many Christians in his diocese were following false teachings and living by values that were not Christian. Peter became known as an outstanding preacher. He also preached to catechumens preparing for Baptism. At the bishops' meeting in

Constantinople in 448, Eutyches, a false teacher, denied that Jesus was both God and man. When the bishops refused Eutyches the right to teach his false ideas, he went to Peter for help. But Peter said, "In the interest of peace and the faith we cannot judge in matters of faith without the consent of the Roman bishop [the pope]." Peter Chrysologus believed that Christians should acquire knowledge to support the Christian faith. He encouraged education as a God-given opportunity and obligation. About 450, Peter died where he had been born: Imola, Italy. Thirteen centuries later, Pope Benedict XIII declared him a Doctor of the Church because of his homilies.



31st July St Ignatius of Loyola, PRIEST (ca. October 27, 1491 – July 31, 1556) was a Spanish knight from a local Basque noble family, hermit, priest since 1537, and theologian, who founded the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and, on 19 April 1541, became its first Superior General. Loyola's devotion to the Catholic Church was characterized by absolute obedience to the Pope.

After being seriously wounded in the Battle of Pamplona in 1521, he underwent a spiritual conversion while in recovery. After claiming to experience a vision of the Virgin Mary and the infant Jesus at the shrine of Our Lady of Montserrat in March 1522, he went to Manresa, where he began praying for seven hours a day, often in a nearby cave, and formulating the fundamentals of the *Spiritual Exercises*. Ignatius and a few followers bound themselves by vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. In 1539, they formed the Society of Jesus, approved in 1540 by Pope Paul III, as well as his *Spiritual Exercises* approved in 1548. Loyola also composed the *Constitutions* of the Society. He died in July 1556, was beatified by Pope Paul V in 1609, canonized by Pope Gregory XV in 1622, and declared patron of all spiritual retreats by Pope Pius XI in 1922. Ignatius is a foremost patron saint of soldiers, the Society of Jesus, the Basque Country, and the provinces of Gipuzkoa and Biscay.

# Parish News - Our Lady of Lourdes Beresfield



'Hello Hunter' is a new initiative of churches in the region aimed at helping people in need.

The following article by Brooke Robinson, <u>published on June 23, 2020 in www.mnnews.today</u> provides us with some information about this great new initiative.

#### Greetings to those requiring assistance

Originally created to assist those affected by the coronavirus pandemic, the program will link people in need with volunteers from churches who

can help. Hello Hunter aids people who are feeling isolated, lonely or anxious. Volunteers are available to make a friendly call, deliver essentials, assist in finding specialised help or on request pray with the person.

Hello Hunter has a call centre, which takes requests for assistance, then neighbourhood hubs mobilise their volunteers. Hubs are formed according to suburb and postcode. The goal is to have the person in need assisted by their nearest neighbour.

Launched on 5 June, Hello Hunter began due to talks between a group of church leaders within Newcastle, headed up by Rick Prosser from Kingdom Works.

Director of Pastoral Ministries, Teresa Brierley, is the representative for the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle. Mrs Brierley said Hello Hunter allows local churches to work together, instead of trying to meet the need on their own.

"We all live in a community, so if that community can look after one another, how good would that be?" Mrs Brierley said.


Once the coronavirus pandemic ends, Hello Hunter will continue to be an ongoing link for those in need.

# Celebrating 5 Years!




St Aloysius Catholic Primary School celebrated its 5<sup>th</sup> Anniversary on Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> June with a special Mass in the school Chapel. Parish Priest, Fr Paul O'Neill celebrated the Mass, which was live streamed from the school

Facebook page.

St Aloysius was opened on 5<sup>th</sup> February 2015. The school was named after St Aloysius, the patron saint of young students. He joined the Jesuits at 17 and died at the age of 23 caring for victims of an epidemic.

The school is an integral part of the Immaculate Conception Parish, Morpeth, and it was our vision to have a Mass on the

school site as part of our 5<sup>th</sup> birthday celebrations. St Aloysius school is a prominent landmark, centrally

#### **The History of the Catholic Church in the Maitland area** Part 12 - Lochinvar Parish

In Australia's early history, the Catholics who had settled in the areas north of Sydney were first served by priests based in Sydney who travelled great distances on horseback to minister to their people. When Fr Dowling was assigned to East Maitland in 1836 his district extended from Newcastle to the Queensland border. It can therefore be assumed that the early Lochinvar district settlers would have occasionally been visited by Fr Dowling, the only resident priest north of Sydney, if not Fr Therry before him.

In 1838 the arrival in New South Wales of more Irish priests enabled more priests to be assigned to the Maitland area.

At **Lochinvar** the first church was built in 1841, the location of which is not known. In 1851 Thomas Winder donated land for four churches in Lochinvar – Catholic, Anglican, Presbyterian and Wesleyan.

In 1858 on the land donated by Thomas Winder (the present site of St Patrick's Church) a church was built. It was a wooden structure and was used as a church and a school. It was described as being "neat in design"...." in the Gothic style". Rev Dean Lynch blessed the church on Sunday 24 October and it was formally opened on Thursday 11 November. Many improvements to the original building were made over the years. Terrible weather conditions in December 1865 proved too much for the buildings foundations and on 21 December, during a fierce wind storm, the building collapsed.

In January 1866, the Catholics of Lochinvar met "to devise means to rebuild their chapel". In an advertisement in the Maitland Mercury on 20 February 1866, Fr A. Phelan of West Maitland invited tenders for the construction of the new church at Lochinvar.



Bishop Murray blessed and opened the new church, dedicated to **St Patrick**, on Tuesday 27 November 1866, "the first church he had the pleasure of assisting in the opening since his arrival in Australia". The Church was in the Gothic style with foundations of stone and a brick superstructure with a slate roof adorned with a cross on the gable. Further improvements to the Church were undertaken in 1896.

Lochinvar was formally "raised to the dignity of a parish" on 16 July 1905. The same day the new presbytery at Lochinvar was blessed and opened and Fr P. C.

McCormack, assistant priest at West Maitland, was named as Lochinvar's first parish priest. Unfortunately the presbytery was gutted by fire on 1 July, 1943 and the contents, including parish records, were destroyed.

In 1914 the parish embarked on a two-staged plan to build a new church that would cater for the needs of the parish into the future. The first stage of the project was the building of a new church at right angles to the existing 1866 church. A temporary structure connected the new portion and the old church so that they could be used together until the larger plan could be completed.



The Lochinvar parishioners, some of whose descendants still live in the area, contributed much to the building of the new church by means of donations and the organization of numerous fundraising events.

On the first Sunday of October in 1932, parishioners and clergy gathered for the laying of the foundation of the new portion of St. Patrick's church, completing the original plan for the church drawn up in 1914. The 1866 church was demolished in keeping with the plan. This was able to be undertaken because of a generous bequest from the late Robert Burgess.

The new church was blessed and opened on 12 February, 1933 by Most Rev. Dr. Gleeson, Bishop of Maitland. At the opening, Monsignor Roche, V.G., "thanked Fr. McCormack, who devised the building, the architect (Mr. T.W. Silk), who planned the beautiful structure and set it in the ground, and the people who did the most difficult part, that of paying."





Today, Lochinvar parish is a part of the Chisholm Pastoral Region with Fr Paul as shared parish priest.




