







Introduction

As we mark our diocesan 'Perpetual Day of Remembrance' which holds before us our history of child sexual abuse and the reality of its continual unfolding for those directly and indirectly affected, we, the faithful, are called to pray.

This resource invites us to reflect on this painful story through the lens of the *Stations of the Cross*, and to contemplate Christ who knows the human experience of abandonment, injustice, shame, evil and death.

For much of Christian history, the *Stations of the Cross* has been one of the faithful's most popular devotions. Perhaps this is because the Stations are so raw and unpalatable, telling a deep human truth that we all recognise and know to varying degrees.

Many of our brothers and sisters who experience abuse cannot pray. Consequently, the responsibility we the baptised have, to pray for the needs of the world and the church, is felt more intensely. For where one member of the Body of Christ suffers, we all suffer. [1 Cor 12:26]

The Mystery of the Cross stands at the centre of Christian faith. In writing to the Corinthians St Paul offers a profound meditation.

The language of the cross may be illogical to those who are not on the way to salvation, but those of us who are on the way, see it as God's power to save. ... while the Jews demand miracles and the Greeks look for wisdom, here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over, to the pagans madness, but to those who have been called, whether they are Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

[1 Cor 1:18, 23-25]

Let those of us who believe and know the cross as 'God's power to save' pray these Stations. Let us remember. Let us lament. Let us hope.

Let us pray!

The feedback from those communities who prayed these stations in 2022 and 2023 was very positive. The community who gathered was small and the experience was powerful. Let us build on this experience in 2024.

Notes

Parishes and other communities will have their customary ways of praying the *Stations of the Cross*. Let that be your guide in praying the following Stations.

Communities will have their own ideas about how to include these Stations in their prayer response to *The Perpetual Day of Remembrance*. The following suggestions are offered for your consideration:

• Pray them in the week ahead of Perpetual Day of Remembrance Sunday.

 Parishes with multiple churches could pray them in each church, on different days and times, in the lead up to the Perpetual Day of Remembrance (15 September) as a type of novena or pilgrimage that culminates with the celebration on the chosen day. Such a repeated praying would create a strong link between the end of Child Protection Week and the Perpetual Day of Remembrance.

Please note:

These Stations do not correspond exactly to those in most Churches.

There are many versions of the Stations of the Cross – including the scriptural based stations – that do not correspond to the traditional stations found in most of our Churches.

The Stations do not need to be prayed in a church. They can be prayed anywhere, in any room, in your home, outside. They can be prayed anywhere that is appropriate to the community. The Stations may also be prayed by individuals.

If they are prayed in the Church, then the focus will not be the stations around the walls of the church. People's attention will need to be focused elsewhere. To assist with this we recommend using either the People's Booklet version or the PowerPoint.

Because of the copyright permission we have gained from Liturgical Press **the Stations themselves cannot be amended** (see Acknowledgement on p 4). We are providing two versions as pdf files: this Master Order of Service and a People's Booklet. Most of the text has been removed from the People's Booklet, in keeping with good liturgical practice and to make the printing more manageable. There is also a PowerPoint.

All resources are on the <u>diocesan website</u>. (Click on the Prayer Response '+' sign.)

Ritual Pattern

These Stations of the Cross invite us to be **present and listen** – to the scripture, to the experience of survivors – **to be silent**, and to pray prayers of lament and hope.

After the Gathering, the fourteen Stations follow the same pattern:

Announcement

We listen to Scripture

We listen to the pain

We lament

We pray in hope

The Stations conclude with a Sending.

Silence is a significant element throughout these Stations and adds to their solemnity. Silence is indicated in the rubrics. Those exercising ministries might be mindful of this and not rush on to the next element.

Symbols

This prayer can be supported by the use of simple and strong symbols. A cross and a candle would be the most obvious choices. The Paschal Candle would be appropriate. Perhaps a bible or lectionary.

It is suggested that you keep it simple. For integrity the symbols function best if they are strong and stark. Avoid using anything that 'beautifies' or 'spiritualises' the very real human suffering the Stations acknowledge and reveal.

Ministries

In order to nurture the solemnity of the Stations you might consider having four people exercise the same ministry throughout the stations. The following is recommended:

- The presider be a non-ordained member of the faithful. The presider's part is specified throughout.
- The reading for each station be done by the same person throughout OR perhaps two people alternating. If the latter, you might alternate a male and female voice.
- 'We Listen to the Pain' are quotes from survivors. These emerge starkly from the silence following the proclamation of the scripture. For this reason, the same strong voice throughout is recommended.
- 'We Lament' be prayed by the recognised leader of the community.
- 'We Pray' is prayed by the presider as indicated in the text
- The Parish Leader, particularly clergy, are present.

In addition to these ministries there is Voice 1 and 2 for the Ode in the Sending. These could be different people, or two of the four who have ministered throughout.

Feedback

Because this is only the second year we are offering this resource, we are looking forward to feedback that will enrich its development. Feedback can be given via the online evaluation sheet on the diocesan website.

Acknowledgements

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We Gather

The people gather in silence.

To settle before beginning, the song 'We Sing for those whose Voice is Silent' OR 'The Innocents' (an instrumental piece specially commissioned by a local survivor of sexual abuse) could be played. The former is available on the diocesan website as an <u>audio file</u> and a <u>video file</u>. The latter is available only as an <u>audio file</u>.

Once silence and stillness have fallen, the following acknowledgement is made.

Acknowledgement of Country

Announcement

Presider: The First Station: Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane All: May God's Kingdom come. May God's will be done.

Silence

We listen to Scripture (Matthew 26:36-41)

Then Jesus came with them to a plot of land called Gethsemane, and he said to his disciples, 'Sit here while I go over there and pray.' He took Peter and the two sons of Zebedee with him. And he began to feel sadness and anguish. Then he said to them, 'My soul is sorrowful to the point of death. Wait here and stay awake with me.' And going on a little further he fell on his face and prayed, saying, 'My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me. Only, not as I want, but as you.' He came back to the disciples and found them sleeping, and he said to Peter, 'So you had not the strength to stay awake with me for one hour? Stay awake and pray not to enter into temptation. The spirit is eager, but the flesh is weak.'

aloneness and fear of death.


Open our eyes, our ears and our hearts to the suffering and abuse that darken our neighbourhoods and communities.

The Second Station: Jesus, betrayed by Judas, is arrested.

Silence

We listen to Scripture (Mark 14:43-46)

While Jesus was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, came up, and with him a crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests, and the scribes, and the elders. Now the traitor had arranged a sign with them, saying, 'The one I will kiss, he is the man. Take charge of him and lead him away securely.' So when he came, he went up to Jesus at once and said, 'Rabbi!' and kissed him. The others laid hands on him and took charge of him.



All: May God's Kingdom come. May God's will be done.

Silence

We listen to Scripture (Luke 22:66-71)

When day broke a meeting of the elders of the people, the chief priests and scribes was convened, and they brought him before their council, saying, 'If you are the Messiah, tell us.' But he said to them, 'If I tell you, you will not believe, and if I question you, you will not answer. But from now on, the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the power of God.' They all said, 'So you are the Son of God?' He answered, 'You say that I am.' Then they said, 'Why do we still need any evidence? We have heard it ourselves from his own lips.'



Presider: The Fourth Station: Jesus Is denied by Peter

Silence

We listen to Scripture (Matthew 26:69-75)

Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard, and a servant girl came up to him saying, 'You too were with Jesus the Galilean.' But he denied it in front of them all, saying, 'I do not know or understand what you mean.' When he went out into the gateway, another servant-girl saw him and said to the people there, 'This man was with Jesus the Nazarene.' And again with an oath he denied it, 'I do not know the man!' A little later the bystanders came up and said to Peter, 'You are certainly one of them too! Why your accent gives you away.' Then he began cursing and swearing, 'I do not know the man.' And at once the cock crowed, and Peter remembered what Jesus had said. 'Before the cock crows you will deny me three times.' He went outside and wept bitterly.

The Fifth Station: Jesus is judged by Pilate

Announcement

Presider: The Fifth Station: Jesus Is judged by Pilate

All: May God's Kingdom come. May God's will be done.

Silence

We listen to Scripture (Mark 15:1-5, 15)

Pilate asked Jesus, 'Are you the king of the Jews?' He replied, 'You say so.' And the chief priests brought many accusations against him. Pilate questioned him again, 'Do you make no reply at all? See how many accusations they are bringing against you!' But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed ...

So Pilate, anxious to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them and, after having Jesus scourged, handed him over to be crucified.


Open our eyes, our ears and our hearts to the suffering and abuse that darken our neighbourhoods and communities.

Pilate then had Jesus taken away and scourged, and the soldiers, twisting thorns into a wreath, put it on his head and clothed him in a purple robe. They kept coming up to him saying, 'Hail, King of the Jews!' and slapping him in the face.



Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall upon us!' and to the hills, 'Cover us!' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will they do when it is dry?'

that darken our neighbourhoods and communities.



But this man did nothing wrong.' Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.' He answered him, 'Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise.'

Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary of Magdala. Seeing his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing near her, Jesus said to his mother, 'Woman, this is your son.' Then to the disciple he said, 'This is your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his home.

It was now after noon and darkness came over the whole land until midafternoon as the sun's light failed. The curtain of the temple was torn right down the middle. Jesus cried out in a loud voice saying, 'Father, into your hands I commit my spirit.' Having said this, he breathed his last.

We listen to Scripture (Matthew 27:57-60)

When it was evening, there came a rich man of Arimathea named Joseph, who had himself become a disciple of Jesus. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then Pilate ordered it to be handed over. So Joseph took the body, wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and put it in his own new tomb which he had hewn in the rock. Then he rolled a large stone to the doorway of the tomb and went away.

We are Sent

Presider: Here are we preaching a crucified Christ. A Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. [1 Cor 1: 23a, 24-25]

Pause before continuing

We are sent from our prayer to proclaim the power and wisdom of God by shining the light of Christ in the dark places of our world and neighbourhoods.

Voice 1 continues after a brief pause.

Voice 1: Come, let us walk in the Light of the Lord. Let us not fear the past when our hearts were heavy. [Is. 2:5]

All: Let us shine the Light of Christ.

Voice 2: Come, let us bring light from the darkness. Let us make evil good and find sweet in the bitter. [Is. 5:20]

All: Let us shine the Light of Christ.

Voice 1: Come, let us weep together when the light grew dark with the clouds, from the darkness and distress. [Is. 5:30]

All: Let us shine the Light of Christ.

Voice 2: Come, let us walk with our brothers and sisters, those who have walked in darkness.

Let them see the great Light of God. [Is. 9:2]

All: and let us shine the Light of Christ.

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Those gathered make the sign of the cross together with the presider.

Presider: Let us live always: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The people depart in silence.
